Instructional Goals and Purposes:

The purpose of this course is to fulfill the academic requirements necessary to earn an associate degree or transfer degree, or to provide personal enrichment opportunities for Panola College students seeking an interdisciplinary course emphasizing communication or converging media.

Learning Outcomes:

After studying all materials and resources presented in the course, the student will be able to:

- Demonstrate ability to operate equipment used to capture and edit photographic images.
- Demonstrate understanding of composition, framing, and perspective in photography.
- Analyze and discuss aesthetic considerations of visual storytelling.
- Discuss ethical implications of photographic manipulation.

Course Content:

A general description of lecture/discussion topics included in this course are listed in the Learning Objectives section of this syllabus.

Students in all sections of this course will learn the following content:

1. Understand a camera to achieve high quality photographs.
2. Understand the rules of effective photographic composition.
3. Understand light and how to manipulate it to achieve high quality photographs.
4. Understand exposure and white balance in photography.
5. Recognize the importance of shutter speed and f-stops in photography.
6. Understand the importance of sharpness.
7. Understand types of lenses and their purpose in photography.
8. Understand when to use flash and how to achieve high quality photographs with flash.
9. Recognize the historical significance of photography as an element for social change, and documenting historical events.
10. Recognize the technological advances that have impacted photography over the years.
11. Recognize the importance of ethical considerations in photography and its use in media.

Methods of Instruction/Course Format/Delivery The course is offered in the traditional classroom and on the LMS Canvas platform for lectures, discussions and audiovisual presentations. Students are required to submit photos in various subject areas, and to compile and end-of-semester portfolio.

Major Assignments / Assessments:

The following items will be assigned and assessed during the semester and used to calculate the student's final grade.

1. Photographs in several categories: campus, action, portrait, landscape-scenic, architecture, macro, creative expression
2. Discussions.
3. End of semester portfolio or photo essay in multimedia format

4. Final exhibit photo grade.
